GIS IN ACTION 2002 "GIS - A COMMON DENOMINATOR"

The GIS in Action conference has been an annual tradition with our region for the past 10 years. This year's conference will be held April 1-3 at the Lloyd Center Double Tree Inn in Portland and will again be jointly sponsored by the Columbia River Region ASPRS and the Oregon/Southwest Chapter of URISA. This year's conference theme is "GIS: A Common Denominator." Technical workshops will be presented on the first day of the conference, Monday, April 1st. Workshops will include 2 hour, ½ day and full day workshops addressing a wide variety of current technologies in GIS and remote sensing. Plenary sessions, vendor exhibits and educational breakout sessions will open on Tuesday, April 2nd and continue through the close of the conference on Wednesday April 3rd.


Jack Dangermond, President of ESRI, will present this year's opening keynote address Tuesday morning. Two additional plenary presentations are scheduled during each of the two the lunch breaks. Tuesday's lunch topic will address activities by URISA and the ASPRS regarding certification of mapping sciences professionals and will be presented by Bill Gentes, URISA's Executive Director, and Mike Renslow, co-chair of the ASPRS Certification Committee. During Wednesday's lunch session Jeff Leonard, President of Earth Data International of Maryland, will present his firm's use of airborne sensors to support search, rescue, and recovery efforts in the wake of the September 11th World Trade Center disaster.

Concurrent educational sessions will be held Tuesday and Wednesday and will be divided into two tracks: "Policy and Management" and "Technology and Process." These sessions will address topics such as systems integration, data accuracies, the integration of GIS and IT, registration/licensing issues affecting photogrammetry and GIS professionals, professional practices and contracting issues in GIS data development, current technologies for developing GIS topographic base layers, GIS applications for security of critical infrastructure, GIS in public works applications and education.

The Applications Fair, which was initiated last year, will again be featured as this year's closing session. In conjunction with the Applications Fair, there will be a raffle with some outstanding prizes. A computer was given away as last year's grand prize. This year the prizes are expected to be even better.

IS IT SURVEYING OR IS IT GIS?: AN UPDATE ON DISCUSSIONS REGARDING THE OVERLAP BETWEEN PHOTOGRAMMETRY, GIS AND SURVEYING - DOUG SMITH

During the last legislative session (Spring 2001), the Professional Land Surveyors of Oregon (PLSO) presented a bill (House Bill 3944) to the legislature in order to revise the State statutes that regulate the practice of land surveying in Oregon. A majority of the items in the bill dealt with the technical and administrative aspects of conducting surveys and did not affect any other professional disciplines. One section of the proposed legislation, however, would have redefined the practice of surveying. Under the new definition, many of the tasks performed by GIS and remote sensing specialists could potentially have been interpreted as "surveying" under the new state

statute. Because of the potential impacts on current GIS and remote sensing practices, several local professional organizations opposed the section of the legislation that sought to change the definition of surveying. After testimony was presented at the legislative committee hearings and the issue was discussed with the PLSO, an agreement was reached to remove the "redefinition" section from the proposed legislation.

In response to the issues that were identified by the proposed legislation, a committee has been formed consisting of representatives from the local survey, GIS and remote sensing professional organizations. Those organizations include OGIC, OGISA, URISA, OAC, OACES, PLSO, OSBEELS, ASPRS and ORMAPS. The goal of this committee is to better define potential areas of overlap between the survey, photogrammetry and GIS professions, and, ultimately to identify a proposed course of action to resolve these issues. To date, discussions have centered around attaining a clear definition of the problem, with emphasis on identifying specific GIS and remote sensing practices that could potentially overlap with survey practices currently regulated by state law.

The committee has established a web site to post the meeting notes and results of discussions. That web address is: http://www.gis.state.or.us/coord/task_force.html. The committee will also present an interactive session at the GIS in Action conference to discuss actions taken so far and to get feedback on the issues at large. As more information is obtained and specific recommendations are formed they will be posted to the web site. We are encouraging our members to participate in this discussion as feed back from our membership will be critical if we are to find an acceptable resolution to this issue.
