

GIS in Action 2002 GIS: A Common Denominator

Three hundred people, including 29 students and volunteers, attended the annual GIS In Action Conference April 1-3, 2002 in Portland, OR. The Columbia River Region of the American Society for Photogrammetry and Remote Sensing (ASPRS) and the Oregon/Southwest Washington Chapter of the Urban and Regional Information Systems Association (URISA) have co-sponsored this conference for the last 10 years to provide a forum for sharing regional perspectives on current issues related to Geographic Information Systems (GIS) and remote sensing. The theme for this year's conference was GIS: A Common Denominator. One of the primary conference objectives was to explore the notion that geography is an important common denominator that can be used to integrate information and knowledge across many different boundaries in a way that improves people's lives, protects the public and the environment, and provides efficiencies in the use and management of information technology.

Another important objective of the conference was to develop a sense of community among GIS users in the region. This sense of community will open new doors for sharing knowledge, experience, and information in the resolution of shared problems.

The first day of the conference included 10 training workshops. The second and third days of the conference included Plenary and Breakout sessions, a Vendor Show, an Application Fair, and numerous social events. Twenty-eight organizations participated in the Vendor Show. More than 100 people attended the workshops. The most popular workshops were: "Exploring the Geodatabase," "Web GIS Models," "Getting Started With Internet Mapping," "Migrating to ArcGIS," and "Using Your Aerial"

The Keynote Speaker was Jack Dangermond, President of Environmental Systems Research Institute (ESRI). He talked about the use of geography and location as a means of integrating information to solve problems, the importance of developing a community of GIS users that cuts across jurisdictional and professional boundaries, and the future of GIS and related technologies. Dangermond also sat on a panel in one of the plenary sessions to listen to and discuss ideas about the use of geography and GIS tools as common denominators that bring people together and provide answers to many of our shared problems. The panel also included local GIS and IT luminaries Dick Bolen (Metro DRC), Bob Swank (LCOG), Ken Dueker (PSU), and Mike Freese (State IT Mgmt. Division).

The conference featured several other plenary speakers as well. Ken Dueker, Portland State University professor and longtime URISA member, presented "URISA's Heritage and the Horwood Legacy," outlining the highlights of URISA's history as an organization. Bill Gentes, URISA Executive Director, talked about URISA's plans for implementing a national GIS professional certification program. Mike Renslow, ASPRS Certification co-chair, provided highlights of the current ASPRS Certification Program. Jeff Leonard, President of EarthData International of Maryland, described his company's use of remote sensing technologies to support emergency response efforts immediately following the September 11th World Trade Center attacks. In particular, EarthData provided ongoing, accurate and reliable remote sensing data from multiple sensors to assist in search, rescue and recovery efforts. The conference concluded with demonstrations of innovative GIS applications and a raffle. The raffle Grand Prize was a notebook computer.

Many of the conference sessions were designed to be highly interactive as a means to leverage the unique knowledge and experience of attendees to address vexing problems shared by everyone in the GIS community. There were scribes in many of the sessions to capture the ideas and discussion. Summaries and PowerPoint slides from many of the sessions have been posted to the conference web site (http://www.orurisa.org/events/ gisinact/2002event/conference.htm), and threaded discussion forums are now available at the web site to continue the discussion and collaboration. The opportunity to share the knowledge and experience of all the conference attendees, not just the presenters, was invaluable.

Interactive sessions included:

- Professional certification and licensing of GIS professionals.
- The convergence of GIS and traditional IT.
- The use of GIS for public safety and protection of critical infrastructure.
- The use of imagery for local and state government functions.
- The role of the higher education system in training GIS professionals.
- The use of new technologies, such as wireless devices, with GIS.

So please, extend this invitation to your colleagues who work in the areas of photogrammetry, remote sensing, and GIS. No commercial presentations or endorsements are allowed. Of course, non-presenters and students are certainly welcome to come and learn more about what's going on around our extended region. We particularly want to encourage non-members to come find out more about ASPRS. As an encouragement, attendees who wish to join ASPRS the day of the session will have the registration fee waived. In addition, any person or company can sponsor a student by covering the \$10 registration fee, so please consider sending students to this session to learn more about our industry and society.
