

### President's Letter: By Anne Hillyer

Greetings fellow Remote Sensors! My term as CRR-ASPRS president is ¾ of the way through and it's time for my third President's Letter/Ramble.

#### **Elections**

We'll be holding elections for Columbia River Region Vice President in December. If you're interested in running let Bob Harmon or Chris Aldridge know. The Vice President position is the beginning of a three-year cycle, where the person serves as Vice President for one year, President for one year, and Past President for one year. The Columbia River Region VP traditionally organizes the yearly National workshop, the Technical Exchange and the Annual Dinner. The President organizes Board meetings, sets meeting times, places and agenda items, writes the President's letter for the quarterly newsletter, writes and submits the year-end report to ASPRS National, and generally takes responsibility for making decisions and getting things done. The President runs the election for new Board members. The Past President heads the nomination committee. The year after being Past President the person co-chairs the GIS in Action conference committee. The National Director represents the CRR at national meetings and heads the membership committee. The Treasurer oversees the budget, requests for funding, payments and purchases and financial reports. For most of us this requires some good juggling skills to balance all of these responsibilities with the job, family and other commitments. The rewards are many: camaraderie, the opportunity to shape events in your community, keeping current with technology, developing organizational skills, and networking. The CRR pays for registration and travel to the national ASPRS conference for the Vice President, President and National Director.

#### **Informal Gathering Series**

I recently sent an e-mail to the general CRR membership (current and former members and friends) asking for volunteers to help organize a series of informal, free, ASPRS gatherings. The senior photogrammetrist in my office remarked "This would be like the annual meetings that used to be held at the Greenwood Inn in Beaverton." The CRR still holds an annual dinner, but it tends to be a formal event. We've also received feedback that ASPRS caters to owners, managers and academics and provides no opportunities for technicians to be involved. We think that these informal, local meetings could provide such an opportunity. However, we need help. As I mentioned above, the Board members have pretty good juggling skills but we do occasionally drop the ball. We need to widen our circle of active participants.

The concept that the Board has discussed is to hold meetings at a local eating/drinking establishment. We're thinking of holding these informal meetings every three months or so, depending on interest level. They could be held jointly with other professional organizations such as engineering, surveying, geographic or GIS groups, depending upon the presentation topics. Jim Meacham offered to organize a meeting in the Eugene/Corvallis area. but he does have his hands full as Vice President this year. The CRR membership has concentrations in the Portland Metro Area, the Bend area, the southern Willamette Valley and the Tri-Cities areas. Ideally we'd like to have local volunteers organize meetings in each of these areas. The event would be a no-host bar/dinner, with no admission fee. We could have a speaker present some topic of interest to ASPRS. ASPRS would pay for the speaker's food and drink. If you have any ideas or would like to help with this, please contact any of the Board members.

#### **Student Liaison Committee**

The CRR Board voted in September to create a new Board position and committee, to be called the Student Liaison Chair and Student Liaison Committee. The Student Liaison Chair will be appointed by vote of the CRR Board and will have a term of 2-3 years. We've appointed Ralph Kiefer to be the initial Student Liaison Chair. The purpose of this position will be to maintain contact with student chapters and handle requests for funding from the student chapters. The Student Liaison Committee will

advise the Student Liaison Chair on issues relevant to student chapters. The interim members of the committee will be Ralph Kiefer, Anne Hillyer and Chris Aldridge, although we would like to have academic members or others join the committee.

The CRR's relationship with student members has evolved over the past several years from awarding scholarships to individual students to giving grants to student chapters. The CRR Scholarship Committee has thus not been needed to award scholarships and has been dissolved. The Board decided to create a position for student liaison so that the Treasurer will not have to directly handle grant requests from student chapters. We recognize that we need to be doing a better job at keeping in touch with student chapters and we're hoping that having this Student Liaison Chair and Committee will allow us to better serve our student members.

The application for student chapter grants requires the student chapter to propose a budget for the academic year. The standard student chapter grant is \$1000.00 per year. Student chapters can use the CRR grant money to cover travel costs to bring in outside speakers for Seminar/Colloquia speakers, send members to conferences, buy software and equipment for the chapter, award scholarships to individual students in the chapter, or any other applicable activity.

Joining a student chapter is a great way to network in the Geospatial community and increase one's chances of finding that dream job.

#### **NW GIS User Group Conference**

I attended the Northwest GIS User Group Conference in Sunriver from September 28-30 this year. Jim Meacham, the CRR Vice President, organized a LiDAR seminar taught by Mike Renslow on Sept. 27. I was unable to attend because I was in a seminar on Geoprocessing Scripts using Python in ArcGIS at the time, although I heard that the LiDAR seminar went well. Mike was able to keep people interested even though the room was overheated and highly conducive to sleep. I heard he even coined a new term: "Lidargrammetry."

We're glad that ASPRS was able to sponsor an event at the GIS conference because we feel that, as an organization, ASPRS needs to emphasize its interconnectedness with the various disciplines within the Geospatial sciences. Due to the increasingly digital nature of data these days and of the interoperability of technologies, the fields within the Geospatial industry are converging more and more. Common data formats and standards have been a constant theme at gatherings of Geospatial professionals, in order to facilitate this convergence. One of the results of this evolution is that no one in the Geospatial industry can afford to be ignorant of what others are doing.

Some ASPRS members present at the conference (Chris Aldridge, Celia Cornett, Anne Hillyer, Jim Meacham, and Doug Smith) met and discussed next year's GIS in Action conference, the upcoming CRR elections, the informal event series, and a new logo for CRR. This logo will be used for the 2008 ASPRS National Conference in Portland and other CRR business. Jim Meacham came up with a promising concept for a logo at the meeting. It resembles a Venn diagram that shows how all the Geospatial sub-fields, namely GIS, Remote Sensing, Photogrammetry, Survey and Cartography overlap and converge around ASPRS.

### National Directors Report: Third Quarter of 2005 By Chris Aldridge

Throughout this year, the CRR board has been working towards energizing our region and trying to provide more services for our region's membership. A recent communiqué from President Anne Hillyer, requesting suggestions for presentation topics, is one of the steps in that direction. I would like to personally urge every member to consider what topics would be most beneficial to our region's members. Our desire is to provide a regular gathering of our members in a relaxed atmosphere to meet, talk, and have the opportunity to learn something new.

As you all are likely aware, the Board of Directors of ASPRS meets twice a year. The meetings are held in various locations around the country, once in spring and once in the fall. Since we are between meetings, I have *little first hand information* to pass to you. However, there are several things that should be of interest to you.

The state of our national membership level is still one of the society's highest priorities. There was an article by national membership chair Don Lauer in September 2005 issue of PE&RS. I recommend that everyone take a few minutes and read that article. It is our responsibility as current members to promote our organization and to attract new members from the private, public, and particularly from the academic sectors. The students of today are the practitioners of tomorrow.

Earlier this year, the ASPRS announced the establishment of The Robert N. Colwell Memorial Fellowship Award. Friends and colleagues of Dr. Colwell (1918-2005) have helped establish this Award as a memorial to him from donated funds administered by the ASPRS Foundation. The Award consists of a certificate and check, in the amount of \$2,000, and also includes a one-in ASPRS. The Award will be made to a graduate student (Master's or Ph.D. level) currently enrolled or intending to enroll in a college or university in the U.S. or Canada, or a recently graduated (within three years of graduation) post-doctoral researcher, who is pursuing a program of study aimed at starting a professional career where expertise is required in remote sensing or other related geospatial information technologies.

This award is the first non-sponsored/non-pass through award to be established by ASPRS since the recovery/reestablishment of the ASPRS Foundation (the BAE Systems best paper award was actually the first, but was fully sponsored by BAE Systems and thus did not require such close coordination with the Foundation).

This is an important step for the ASPRS, as it marks the return of the ASPRS foundation. President Karen Schuckman recently approved the appointment of three new members to the ASPRS foundations board of trustees. Bryan Logan, Marilyn O'Cuilinn, and Bernard Shaw join Mike Renslow, Roger Crystal, and Tom Lillesand as the six-member board of trustees. Initial funding will come from donations and matching contributions form ASPRS, much like the building fund drive. To date this has been so successful, that the board was asked to, and did approve, an increase to the matching limit by \$50.000.00.

On a less happy note, the ASPRS received a reply from Dr. Mary Cleave at NASA, regarding funding Remote Sensing Model Curriculum effort at Ole Miss. We had hoped for a review of prior decisions and possible additional funding for the program. While not unexpected, the reply certainly is not what we were hoping to hear! In brief, because of NASA's tightly constrained budget, they will not continue funding beyond the \$7 million that has already been committed to the program. This places the funding of continued development of future modules on other sources, yet to be named.

As a final bit of housekeeping, the change to the national bylaws that I mentioned in the last newsletter was passed by the board in August. These changes, while not earth shaking, have made it easier to establish chapters within our organization. This should help us to continue to expand our presence on college campuses around the country, and in harder to reach areas of the larger regions.

I'm looking forward to attending the fall meeting in South Dakota later this month, and I am sure that I will have a wealth of information for you all in our final newsletter.

# Full Text of *Photogrammetric Engineering* and *Remote Sensing* (*PE&RS*) Journal Now Available Online

ASPRS has implemented electronic access to peer-reviewed articles published in *Photogrammetric Engineering and Remote Sensing (PE&RS)*, thereby complementing the existing online text for non-peer-reviewed articles. This action completes the goal of making the full text of each journal issue available online and provides timely information to address the needs of the academic community and the members located overseas who often experience delays in the delivery of their printed copy. Online access of *PE&RS* was one of the most requested benefits in the recently completed ASPRS Membership Survey.

In addition to the abstract text, which has been routinely available electronically for a number of years, ASPRS members may now access the full text of all peer-reviewed articles that appear in *PE&RS* as soon as the issue is printed and prior to the actual mailing. By logging in to the ASPRS web site with their membership ID and password, any ASPRS member in good standing may read and download up to three peer-reviewed articles in a single log in session.

Full text for all peer-reviewed articles from January 2003 to date is currently available on the ASPRS website. It is expected that older seminal articles will also be posted in scanned form, with searchable abstracts, by later in 2006. "Having these articles available online has been a goal for several years. ASPRS now has the capability to post these articles for ASPRS member use," said Kimberly Tilley, *PE&RS* Executive Editor. "This is a major benefit to all of our membership. The articles will remain on the 'Members Only' section of the website for at least one year, then selected articles will be posted on the main portion of the website for public access."

A key benefit of ASPRS membership is timely access to peer-reviewed journal articles discussing the most recent advancements in the science. ASPRS is committed to providing resources to its members in a manner that helps them solve their most pressing challenges through the application of technical information to their everyday work environment. By putting these published materials on line, available first to ASPRS members only, ASPRS is bringing those materials right to the desktop. In addition, ASPRS academic members benefit from access to the latest information, knowledge, and resources being published in the field.
