A word from Chris Aldridge, Director, Columbia River Region

Season's Greetings to all of the members of the Columbia River Region. The last months of every year are typically defined by a certain level of frantic activity. Summer has come to a close, vacations are finished, the government turns over a new fiscal year, and students return to their classrooms, and the ASPRS holds our national fall meeting.

The Columbia River Region has been active during this period as well. I offer my congratulations to Jake Macdonald, our seated VP, for organizing and executing the Joint Technical Exchange with the PSR. For those of you who managed to attend, and about 60 of you did, I'm sure that you will agree with me that the program was excellent this year.

Planning for GIS in Action 2011 is well underway and the event is scheduled for March 29-30, 201. The event will be held at Portland State University again this year. Planning for the 2012 conference, which will be a joint effort between ASPRS, URSIA, and the PLSO is also underway. We are finalizing details of this ground breaking collaboration and will announce the location and dates as soon as they are finalized.


The Executive Committee of the Region has met twice and conducted a number of housekeeping chores for the end of the year, including assembling the Policy and Procedures Manual for the Region.

Nationally, the society has been continuing to support the programs and initiatives that are important to the geospatial community. The fall national meeting was held in Orlando, Florida on November 15-19, with committee and board meetings held on November 13-15. This meeting "the Special Joint Symposium of ISPRS Technical Division IV and AutoCarto 2010, in conjunction with ASPRS/CaGIS Specialty Conference" was decidedly different from recent fall meetings and included a strong international component. Besides the ASPRS, CaGIS, and ISPRS, MAPPS and the NSPS each held concurrent meetings at the facility. This proved to be a truly "geospatial" atmosphere around the conference center for the entire week. The conference attendance was over 500, which a strong number for the fall meeting (this did not include the NSPS or MAPPS attendees who registered for those meetings separately).

I offer the following summary of the society's status and the board and committee meetings:

The organization as a whole is very healthy, although several regions are struggling. Financially we are rock solid and our reserve account investments have recovered to their pre-recession numbers, which is itself a small miracle. The budget for 2011 was passed by the Board, and essentially remains the same as 2010.

One area of revenue that showed substantial decline is membership dues. This is down significantly from 2009 for the simple reason that membership is SIGNIFICANTLY down from 2009. Overall, the organization has seen and 8% drop in our active members. Student membership has increased by 15%, which is the bright spot in membership right now and with proper mentoring and retention efforts speaks well for the long term future. The biggest immediate concern is the dramatic drop in Active Members, which reflects a serious problem for the society. The simple fact is fewer professionals see value in membership in our and other professional societies. It is our job as members, in fact our duty, to explain this value and to help recruit professionals who will benefit from and contribute to the continued growth of the society.

The Certification Program is making headway towards accreditation, which will further elevate the ASRPS certifications in Photogrammetry, Remote Sensing, and GIS/LIS above all the other certifications offered by other organizations. Another group, the Coordinate Metrology Society, is currently engaged in discussion with the Certification Committee and is seeking our guidance in establishing a program of their own. This is a compliment to the success and execution of our program!

The ASPRS Webinar Series has met with tremendous success and very positive reviews. This program, initially undertaken with some trepidation has been fully embraced by headquarters and the Board. Plans to expand the services and workshops are underway, so look for changes on the website.

Speaking of the website, it is undergoing a long overdue and complete overhaul. The mock up of the new home page was presented to the board and met with applause. It is a HUGE step forward in the correct direction. The process is ongoing and expected to take a few more months, but a much improved and easier to read and navigate website in our near future.

A couple of key external affairs:

The LandSAT Data Continuity Mission is moving forward and the lunch date of the new sensor is scheduled for December 2012. After that it is anyone's guess what will really happen to the program. It all comes down to funding, and there is currently some wrangling going on between government agencies about who will get to pick up the check.

The Guidelines for Commercial Product Procurement are nearing a place where they will be publicly presented for comment. This document will become a companion to the Guidelines for Procuring Professional Photogrammetry Services and together will hopefully explain the best practices for Federal, State, Local, and private concerns for acquiring geospatial services and products.

Internally, a proposal has been put forth to create a new technical division within the society. A "LiDAR and Active Sensors" division has been proposed and is currently going through the process required to create a new division. This action sparked a great deal of discussion with regards to the current structure of the Society and an overdue look at how we are organized.

In closing, I invite you all to attend our annual meeting, to be held in late January or February. Please watch your email and the region website for information regarding time, date, and location. Until then, I wish you all a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year!



Events:


Some of our student members were able to attend the Joint Technical Exchange in Vancouver, WA and the LiDAR Technical Session in Corvallis, OR.

ASPRS AND THE ASPRS FOUNDATION RECEIVE \$90,000 DONATION TO FULLY ENDOW A NEW OUTSTANDING TECHNICAL ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

In early December the American Society for Photogrammetry and Remote Sensing (ASPRS) and the ASPRS Foundation received an individual donation with a value of approximately \$90,000 to endow a new Outstanding Technical Achievement Award. The award will be administered through ASPRS and funded by the ASPRS Foundation. In accordance with the wishes of the donor, who is a longtime ASPRS member, this donation was made anonymously. ASPRS has agreed to match \$35,000 of the donation in accordance with its current matching policy, for a total of approximately \$125,000. The result of the match ensures that the Award will be fully endowed at the \$5000 per annual award level.

The Award will be known as the ASPRS Outstanding Technical Achievement award during the lifetime of the donor. The purpose of the Award is to reward the developers of specific breakthrough technology which causes major advances in the practice of photogrammetry, remote sensing, or geographic information systems in the United States. The achievement must be recent, but need not occur within the year prior to the award, as it is recognized that the significance of critical contributions may not immediately become evident.

ASPRS Foundation President Roger Crystal praised the donor for their extremely generous donation saying, "This is a significant milestone for the ASPRS Foundation, and I hope it inspires others to consider similar contributions to the profession and to the community from which we all derive so much satisfaction."

ASPRS President Dr. Carolyn Merry expressed her gratitude for the donor's generosity and added "this Award will be one of the largest given by ASPRS and rightfully so, since our community depends so heavily on the developmental work this Award is intended to recognize. One of the greatest strengths of the ASPRS community has been its ability, over more than 75 years, to constantly bring forward technological advances that maintain our profession as truly state-of-the-art. By recognizing these advances as they occur, this Award will hopefully ensure we remain on a strong technological trajectory."

The Selection Committee for this award, consisting of the ASPRS President and the ASPRS Technical Division Directors, will evaluate each achievement for its economic and scientific impact to the profession. Practicability is the essence of the Award, and with this as a criterion the merits of candidates will be considered by the Committee with respect to the following points, giving greatest weight to the first:

- 1. An outstanding invention or design involving any type of equipment that applies to the photogrammetry, remote sensing, or geographic information management.
- 2. Any outstanding method developed for the use of photogrammetry, remote sensing, or geographic information.

The Award consists of a silver presentation plaque mounted on a walnut wood panel, plus a cash award of \$5,000, and will be given annually if a worthy candidate is identified. The Award will be made solely to an individual or a plurality of individuals jointly, and will not be made to companies, agencies, bureaus, or associations. However, their personnel are eligible as individuals to receive this very prestigious Award.





Michael D. Golden, 56, Portland, OR, passed away unexpectedly in Tulum, Mexico on October 27, 2010 in a kayaking accident.

Michael joined ASPRS in 1988 and was an active member. Michael started his career as a Remote Sensing Specialist with the USDA Forest Service in Alaska. He then joined Pacific Meridian Resources as a Remote Sensing Specialist for Pacific Meridian. In 1999, Michael returned to the USDA Forest Service in Portland, Oregon as the Lead Remote Sensing Specialist for the Pacific Northwest Region.

Michael is remembered for his leadership, intellect, resourcefulness, sense of humor, and kindness to all people that he met. His passing is a great loss to his professional peers, friends and family.


